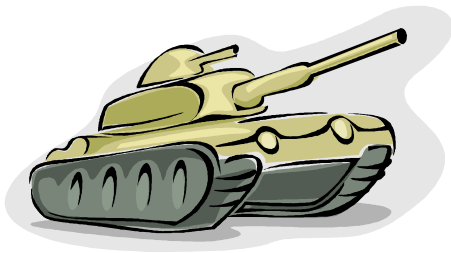

Hitler, leader of Germany, wanted to control Europe.

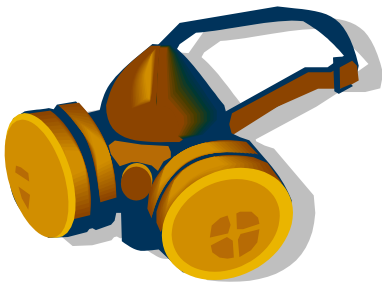
Britain went to war with Germany.

The war lasted 6 years. It ended in 1945.



Everyday life



War changed day to day life for everybody.

You had to carry an identity card to prove you were a friend and not an enemy!



You were given a gasmask, in case of a gas attack.

You had to put black cloth over your windows so enemy planes couldn't see you.

In an air raid, sirens would go off and everyone had to go into an air raid shelter to keep safe.

Children were sent home from school if enemy planes were flying around the building!

Shetland



The first German bomb from World War 2 landed in Shetland.

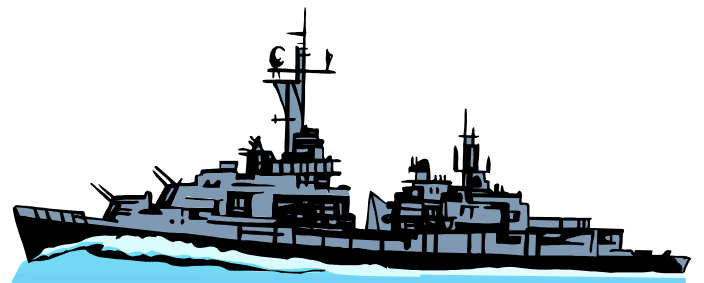
Bombs fell from planes, mines exploded in the sea, and ships were attacked.



British soldiers stayed in Shetland—they attacked the German Navy ships that went by, and helped to keep people safe.

Some Shetland men went away to fight as soldiers.

Others went into the navy or the air force.



Shetland lasses were needed too—many worked for the navy, the air force and the army, And helped to look after wounded soldiers.



At Home



Local men, too young or old to fight, stayed at home and helped keep everyone safe.

Germany invaded Norway in 1940—everyone was afraid that Shetland would be attacked.



The men who stayed home were important—they looked out for enemies and helped everybody in air raids.



The soldiers who came to Shetland helped the locals look out for enemies too.

Shetland women sold their knitting—the warm clothes they made were good for soldiers!



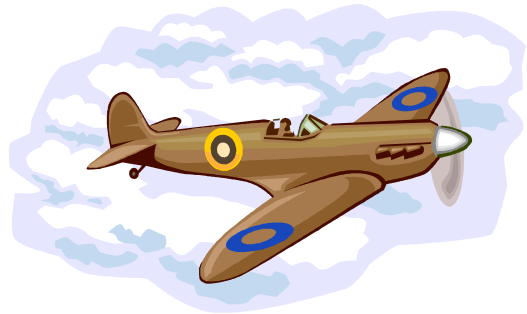
Out to fight



Lots of Shetland men went out to fight with Britain in the war.

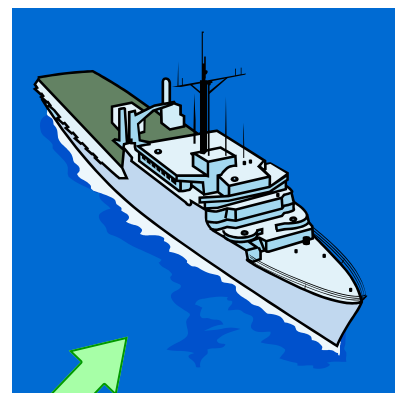
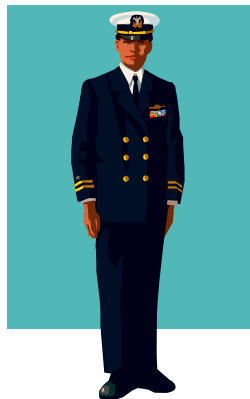


Some were soldiers in the army.

The Shetland Bus

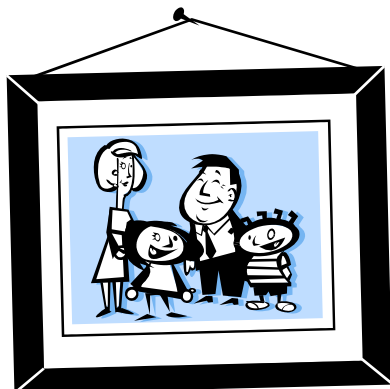
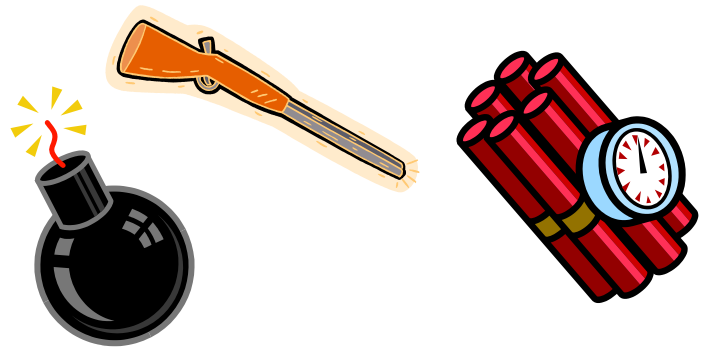
A secret group took fishing boats from Shetland to Norway.

Germany started fighting with Norway, and it was very unsafe to stay there.

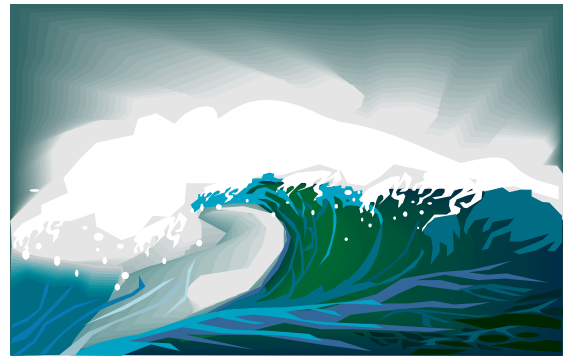
The boats took people Norway to Shetland to keep them safe.
