




Friendship forms in the midst of war between a young German boy and a Russian bomber-dog in this poignant and gripping historical adventure.


I'm not like the other children in my class . . . and that's an actual scientific FACT.

If you've ever felt different, out of place, like you don't fit in . . . this book is for you.








A search for treasure reveals the toxic consequences of modern life in this thrilling adventure set against the backdrop of the world's largest e-waste dump.

But Emmanuel's presence draws the attention of a local gang, and Theo starts to wonder if his new friend is keeping dangerous secrets ...




Can Jordan learn to navigate his new school culture while keeping his neighbourhood friends and staying true to himself?










Billy Plimpton is an eleven-year-old boy with a **big** dream.

The idea for this story came from Helen Rutter's son, who has a stammer: she wanted to write the book that he would love to read, starring a child like him.













Join Effie Kostas as she fights to become Student Council President in her new school.






My name's Archie Albright, and I know two things for certain:









When the lighthouse no longer shines, what else has the power to guide you to shore?




Ella is the new girl at school. She doesn't know anyone and she doesn't have any friends.

And she has a terrible secret.


