




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Shetland: Location

Lerwick is Lat 60° 9' N Lon 1° 9' W






Climate

Observations are recorded in Shetland by staff employed by the Meteorological Office in Lerwick, Sellaness and Sumburgh. There are also official Auxiliary Synoptic Reporting Stations in Fair Isle and Foula.

Observations from the Lerwick Observatory began in 1921, although the first full year of recordings was not until 1922. The recorded meteorological observations from Lerwick Observatory for 1994 are as follows:







Population

After decades of decline the population of Shetland, which had fallen to nearly 17,000 in the mid-1960s, rose by 35% between 1971 and 1981 as a direct result of oil related activity. In the early 1980s the population fell due to out migration after the end of oil construction activity and difficulties at Sumburgh Airport. In the latter half of the 1980s and the early 1990s the population level has been fairly stable.

Within the overall picture there is a shift towards a more elderly society and fewer young people entering the labour market. This is a national trend and needs to be borne in mind when considering the level of service provision illustrated later on in this booklet.

Another issue related to population and the subsequent topic of unemployment is that of depopulation. As the table on page 15 shows, Shetland has a low level of unemployment compared to other areas of Scotland.



The 1991 estimate is the more accurate representation of the usually resident population. However, for comparative purposes with the 1981 figure, the 1991 estimate on the same basis, 21,905, represents a drop of nearly 900 (4%) for the decade.



Introduction to Economy and Industry

One of the key aims of providing statistics is to give a sense of proportion to the various activities that take place within Shetland. The economy is an important factor in this and particularly the primary industries, because in one form or another they exploit the resources that are locally available.

As the role of the oil industry declines in Shetland it is important that its value in economic terms is replaced. The approach taken has been to identify and encourage potential development opportunities in the primary industries. At present this approach would seem to be succeeding and although the relative value of the oil industry has declined since its peak in the early 1980s, it still provides a significant input to the local economy which it is hoped will continue well into the future.

The table below shows the trends in output in the primary industries over the past decade. Whilst it is encouraging to note that over this time total output has more than doubled, this growth is greater in certain sectors, particularly fisheries and within this specifically salmon farming.



Knitwear

The knitwear industry is currently enjoying a period of success in terms of sales and growth after a period of decline. One of the major issues facing the industry now is to regain its competitive position in the face of lower cost production, particularly from the Far East. In practice this has become increasingly concentrated on the need for knitwear manufacturers to mechanise their production and/or to identify the markets best suited to their garments whether traditional or machine made. Increased mechanisation is leading to a decline in the number of home knitters and an increase in the number of factory based employees.

Markets

Nearly 50 per cent of the garments made are directly exported throughout the world from Shetland. Of the remaining garments, about 40 per cent go to the UK market, many of which are sold to London retailers and wholesalers and exported. About 10 per cent are sold locally.

The major marketing problem is the plagiarism of the word 'Shetland' by knitwear manufacturers all over the world. Many millions more garments labelled 'Shetland' are turned out than are actually produced in the islands or can actually be accounted for by the production of wool from native sheep. Wool production for 1994 is estimated at about 300,000 kilos.

A number of Shetland knitwear manufacturers came together in 1983 to form the Shetland Knitwear Trades Association in order to promote 'Real' Shetland knitwear. A new certification trademark was patented (The Shetland Lady) and this forms the cornerstone of the Association's marketing campaign.

Crafts

Shetland has a long tradition of producing high quality craft goods. The main products apart from knitwear include, tweed, jewellery (using local stones and designs), silverwork, pottery, leatherwork, woodwork, fiddle-making, tapestry, printed goods and cast figurines. There are also a number of local artists and photographers and there are approximately 40 people employed in the printing industry.

While the total number of people employed in craft work is not high, many of the businesses are located outside Lerwick and provide a valuable source of income in rural areas. The value of output (sales) in 1991/1992 was estimated to be c.£800,000. Many of the craft businesses sell through craft and trade fairs on the mainland as well as to visitors locally.

Oil

The North Sea oil industry has long been recognised as a key component of not only Shetland's economy but the economy of the UK as a whole. At a local level this reflects in three main areas: Sullom Voe Oil Terminal, the offshore oil and gas fields and the services related to both of these.

Sullom Voe Oil Terminal

The Terminal is situated at Calback Ness on a site of approximately 400 hectares (1,000 acres) on the shores of Sullom Voe, 46km (29 miles) north of Lerwick. It is Europe's largest oil and liquefied gas terminal and has a capacity to handle over half the UK's potential offshore oil production. BP Exploration Operating Company Ltd. operates the Terminal on behalf of c. thirty companies participating in the Brent and Ninian pipeline groups. The Terminal currently has a throughput design capacity of 1.2 million barrels of crude oil per day and reached a peak in 1984 with a total receipt of 439,434,656 barrels (58,328,785 tonnes), an average of over 1.2 million barrels per day. It now averages at just over 780,000 barrels per day.

Exploration and Development

- 1970 The exploration phase for oil and gas offshore Shetland began when the Government allocated the first Licence Blocks.
- 1975 The development phase including the laying of the Brent and Ninian pipeline systems and the floatout of the Beryl and Brent field production platforms. Construction work began on the Sullom Voe Oil Terminal.
- 1978 The first oil was piped to Sullom Voe through the Brent pipeline from the Dunlin oilfield on 25th November. The first oil was shipped out from the terminal by the Shell tanker 'Donovania' five days later and on 3rd December the first oil arrived through the Ninian pipeline from the Heather oilfield. On 31st December the fuel bunkers of the tanker 'Esso Bernicia' were ruptured when she hit a mooring bollard. Resulting oil spillage caused widespread pollution around Yell Sound shores.
- 1980 Construction workforce peaked at over 7000.
- 1982 In April the first fractionation of gas took place at the terminal and a month later the first gas was shipped out. In December the final construction and commissioning work at the terminal was completed and Sullom Voe received its one billionth (1,000 million) barrel of oil.
- 1987 In September LPG processing and shipment was suspended for major repairs to corrosion under insulation on process pipelines (CUI). On 30th October the three billionth barrel of stabilised crude oil was produced at the terminal. The Alwyn North field was brought on stream in November through the Ninian line.
- 1990 In March the 412,611 metric tonne deadweight supertanker 'Chevron North America' was the largest tanker to visit the terminal. On 8th July the four billionth barrel of crude oil was produced at the terminal. In August the crude oil was commingled and renamed Brent Blend.
- 1992 In March, Staffa, a subsea development, linked to Ninian South platform 8.5km away, came on stream. On 1st December, PIMS Commingling, the blending of Brent and Ninian crude, took place for the first time after metering and before stabilisation.
- 1993 In March, Lyell came on stream followed in December by Strathspey. On 22nd December the five billionth barrel of oil was produced to store.
- 1994 The longest tanker to berth at Sullom Voe arrived in January, the 'Concordia 1' measured 370 metres in length. In August the terminal recorded one million manhours without a lost time injury. The Norwegian registered 'Companion' loaded the largest cargo of oil from the terminal, 349,454 metric tonnes, in September. October saw the Ninian Field producing its billionth barrel of oil and the Ninian Pipeline System produced its second billionth barrel of oil in November.

Conservation

Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest

The Secretary of State for Scotland compiles lists of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest in order that such buildings may be identified and appropriate measures for their conservation can be taken. The list for Shetland contains a wide variety of building types and styles from castles to crofthouses and is sub-divided into categories. Category A buildings are of national and international importance whilst those in Category C(s) are of more local interest, of lesser importance or altered. The greatest number of buildings on the list are Category B and are representative of many of Shetland's most notable periods, styles, architects and famous people. Any works to a listed building which would affect its character (including demolition) normally requires permission (known as "Listed Building Consent") for which an application is made to the Council as Planning Authority. There are a wide range of planning powers and duties in respect of listed buildings which seek to conserve and enhance this fine built heritage.

Scheduled Ancient Monuments

The Secretary of State maintains a schedule of ancient monuments of national importance and publishes a list of them from time to time. The list is for the whole of Scotland but arranged by local authority area. It is categorised according to type of monument. The only category not represented in Shetland is for Roman monuments but, as can be seen, the majority of scheduled ancient monuments are of prehistoric origin. There are a wide range of powers in respect of archaeological sites generally and scheduled ancient monuments in particular. The development planning and development control processes (exercised mainly by the Council) take account of archaeology generally, whilst works which would affect a scheduled ancient monument require the permission of the Secretary of State (Scheduled Monument Consent).

The List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest for Shetland and the Schedule of Ancient Monuments in Scotland are held by the Director of Planning where they are open for public inspection by appointment.



Coastguard Services

Coastguard is an Executive Agency which discharges the Department of Transport's responsibility for marine search and rescue and counter pollution operations in UK waters. Shetland Coastguard Maritime Rescue Sub Centre (MRSC) located at the Knab in Lerwick is manned 24 hours a day by a team of three Coastguard Officers. Auxiliary Coastguard Rescue Companies (CRCs) are located at various points around the Shetland coast. A Sikorsky S61N helicopter based at Sumburgh is under contract to Coastguard and is available 24 hours a day.


