

Lerwick is Lat 60'09' N Lon 01'09' W Approximate distances from Shetland in kilometres (statute miles)





Weather

Observations are recorded in Shetland by staff employed by the Meteorological Office in Lerwick and Sella Ness. There are also official Auxiliary Synoptic Reporting Stations in Fair Isle and Foula. Observations from the Lerwick Observatory began in 1921, although the first full year of recordings was not until 1922. (Lerwick Observatory: 60°08'N, 01°11'W. Wind vane 93m above sea level). The recorded meteorological observations from Lerwick Observatory for 1997 are as follows:







Population

After decades of decline the population of Shetland, which had fallen to nearly 17,000 in the mid-1960s, rose by 35% between 1971 and 1981 as a direct result of oil related activity. In the early 1980s the population fell due to out migration after the end of oil construction activity and difficulties at Sumburgh Airport. In the latter half of the 1980s and the early 1990s the population level has been fairly stable.



Economy and Industry

Economic Performance

The output value of the Shetland economy was estimated to be £475.7 million for 1997. This represents a rise of £19.2 million on the 1996 total. The table below shows how the individual sectors performed with the main features being the £5 million plus increase in oil production (the running costs of Sullom Voe Terminal) and a £7.4 million increase in fisheries (the combined output from fish catching, fish farming and fish processing). The Council's outturn figures were down by £0.8 million, continuing the trend of expenditure reduction. The rise in the value of the economy is reflected in the service sector total (construction, retail, oil services, government, etc.) which is up by £7.0 million on the previous year.

As the role of the oil industry declines in Shetland, it is important that its value in economic terms is replaced. The approach taken has been to identify and encourage potential development opportunities in the traditional industries. At present this approach would seem to be succeeding and although the relative value of the oil industry has declined since its peak in the early 1980s, it still provides a significant input to the local economy which it is hoped will continue well into the future.



Knitwear

The major marketing problem facing the Shetland knitwear industry is the plagiarism of the word 'Shetland' by knitwear manufacturers all over the world. Many millions more garments labelled 'Shetland' are turned out than are actually produced in the islands, or can actually be accounted for by the production of wool from the native sheep. To counter this a certification trademark, 'The Shetland Lady', was registered. This forms the cornerstone of the industry's marketing activities.

The North Sea oil industry has long been recognised as a key component of not only Shetland's economy but the economy of the UK as a whole. At a local level this reflects in three main areas: Sullom Voe Oil Terminal, the offshore oil and gas fields and the services related to both of these,

Sullom Voe Oil Terminal

The terminal is situated at Calback Ness on a site of approximately 400 hectares (1,000 acres) on the shores of Sullom Voe, 46km (29 miles) north of Lerwick. BP Exploration Operating Company Ltd. operates the terminal on behalf of c. twenty-seven companies participating in the Brent and Ninian pipeline groups. The terminal currently has a throughput design capacity of 1.2 million barrels of crude oil per day and reached a peak in 1984 with a total receipt of 439,434,656 barrels (58,328,785 tonnes). It now averages at 625,000 barrels per day.

Exploration and Development

- 1970 The exploration phase for oil and gas offshore Shetland began when the Government allocated the first Licence Blocks.
- 1975 The development phase including the laying of the Brent and Ninian pipeline systems and the floatout of the Beryl and Brent field production platforms. Construction work began on the Sullom Voe Oil Terminal.
- 1978 The first oil was piped to Sullom Voe through the Brent pipeline from the Dunlin oilfield on 25th November. The first oil was shipped out from the terminal by the Shell tanker 'Donovania' five days later and on 3rd December the first oil arrived through the Ninian pipeline from the Heather oilfield.
- 1980 Construction workforce peaked at over 7000.
- 1982 In April the first fractionation of gas took place at the terminal and a month later the first gas was shipped out. In December the final construction and commissioning work at the terminal was completed and Sullom Voe received its one billionth (1,000 million) barrel of oil.
- 1994 In August the terminal recorded one million manhours without a lost time injury.
- 1997 ~ In January BP announced that, subject to the satisfactory outcome of final negotiations, it intended to enter into an agreement with Sullom Voe Terminal to handle the crude oil produced from the Schiehallion field west of Shetland. On 13th June the six billionth barrel of crude oil was produced at the terminal.
- 1998 During April the terminal was awarded, for the fourth consecutive year, the Gold Award for Occupational Safety by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents. On 24th April the 'Hellespont Grand' became the largest tanker to visit the terminal with a dead-weight of 421,680 metric tonnes, she was also the longest tanker to berth at the terminal, some 378 metres long and took the largest cargo from the terminal, 376,000 metric tonnes. In May the LPG ship 'Havrim', 37,300 cu.m., was the 1,000th LPG vessel to visit the terminal since operations commenced.

Auxiliary Coastguard Rescue Companies (CRCs) are located at various points around the Shetland coast. A Sikorsky S61N helicopter based at Sumburgh is under contract to Coastguard and is available 24 hours a day.

Conservation

Conservation Areas

Conservation Areas are areas of architectural or historic interest, the character and appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance. The designation recognises the value of groups of buildings and their settings and allows them to be treated as a whole. The Council, as Planning Authority, has designated three Conservation Areas in Shetland: Lerwick Lanes Outstanding Conservation Area (designated in 1975 and classified by the Secretary of State); Lerwick New Town Conservation Area (1986); and Scalloway Conservation Area.

Scheduled Ancient Monuments

The Secretary of State maintains a schedule of ancient monuments of national importance and publishes a list of them from time to time. The only Scottish category not represented in Shetland is for Roman monuments but, as can be seen, the majority of scheduled ancient monuments are of prehistoric origin.

Archaeology

The Sites and Monuments Record

There are far more archaeological sites in Shetland than those which have been scheduled. Indeed, the scheduled monuments form only a small percentage of the 5,600 sites currently listed in the Shetland Sites and Monuments Record, a record which is constantly growing. The Sites and Monuments Record, established in 1986, covers the whole of Shetland, from Fair Isle to Unst, and is held by Shetland Amenity Trust. It is used to provide a regular information service to developers, researchers, for school projects and the general enquirer. The record is maintained by the Shetland Archaeologist and an assistant, and is pivotal to their work of initiating and co-ordinating archeological activity all over the islands.

Excavation

There has been an increasing amount of archaeological excavation carried out in Shetland in recent years. Small scale rescue excavations (e.g. a burnt mound at Tangwick, Northmavine, and an Iron Age house sited at Bayanne, Yell) are usually supported by Historic Scotland.

In 1995 Shetland Amenity Trust engaged the University of Bradford in order to carry out excavation of a broch site at Old Scatness, Dunrossness. The site comprised an unexcavated time capsule, the preservation of which was expected to be good. The "Old Scatness and Jarlshof Environs Project" formed an unusual attempt to examine how brochs fitted into the Iron Age land-scape and related to other sites close by.

With the first phase (1995-97) completed, the results of the excavation are far exceeding expectations. The broch (standing at least 5m high) is surrounded by a late Iron Age village which has about 10 structures standing to at least 1.5m high. At least one of these has a complete corbelled roof still in place. The level of preservation of environmental evidence is also extremely good, with bone surviving which will provide valuable information about the lives and economy of the people who lived there.

The second phase of the project is due to take place between 1998 and 2000. Visitors are welcome at the site throughout the excavation season (July and August), during which time a "Living History" team demonstrates how some of the objects found on the site were made, as well as carrying out experimental work. When buildings have to be moved in order to allow the excavation to continue beneath, they will be reconstructed in order to continue to display the range of activities and periods represented at Old Scatness. The Pictish smithy was reconstructed in 1997 to form the first of these.

Phase one of the project was funded from a variety of sources, the major contributors being EC Objective One, Shetland Enterprise, Shetland Islands Council and Shetland Amenity Trust. Other contributors include the British Academy, University of Bradford, Farquhar and Jamieson and DITT.

Nature Conservation

Scottish Natural Heritage is the independent government agency responsible for safeguarding and enhancing Scotland's countryside and wildlife, and promoting the understanding and enjoyment of the natural heritage.




